Total Exposure

Yousha sleeps with her children on the floor of the jungle. Her tribe has been attacked by her fellow countrymen for the third time in 3 years. From a distance she can see her village, along with all of her possessions, being destroyed by fire. Her children have no clothes and no protection from the elements. She tells our partners that she has been praying for a miracle.

Yousha is one of thousands of widows, just trying to survive long enough to realize peace and protection. Food, water and first aid are delivered by our indigenous partners, but the construction of a shelter is not always an option for refugees on the run. In the fight for survival, one little blanket can be the difference between life and death.



This child wraps himself in a blanket that was distributed by our indigenous partners. The blanket was cut from a larger blanket, previously owned by an American family.

When enemies attack their village, the blanket is often the only item that leaves the home with the child.

The blanket provides protection from the elements, mosquitoes, leaches and even rats.



Sewing Blankets / Sowing Love

The creation of repurposed blankets is one of the most rewarding projects in which US partners can participate. Some donors use the opportunity to engage their own families in the charitable act of creating and giving love. It is as simple as cutting a used family blanket into sections of 45”x45” and hemming the edges so they do not fray. This rewarding project can be completed in a single evening.
